

701. **Echionidis** – the patronymic refers to Pentheus, whose father was Echion, one of the five **anguigenae** (531) who founded Thebes. A word like **famulos** is understood as the D.O. of **iubet**.

702. **electus** – modifies **Cithaeron**, the mountain where the followers of Bacchus gather to celebrate their rites.

704-706. **ut . . . sic** – *as . . . so* introduces a simile.

706. **Penthea** – the accusative in a Greek word. Note the arrangement of the words here.

707. **ira** – the final syllable is long by position, but not by nature – it is the subject of the verb **recanduit**.

708. **ferē** is in the middle of the phrase it qualifies.

710. **hic** – the **i** must be long as the first syllable in the line, so the word is the adverb *here*.

711-712. **prima** – modifies **mater**, postponed to line 713 to heighten the horror of the actions described. Note that **missō** is here just an adjective, meaning *(having been) hurled, thrown*.

713. **adeste** – the imperative of **adsum**, not **adeo**.

715. The anaphora of **ille** is emphasized by the passive periphrastic and the expressed dative of agent, **mihi**.

716-718. The accusative adjectives and participles are all modifying an understood **Penthea**.

718. **se pecca(vi)sse** – indirect statement depending on **fatentem**.
